

Ride for the Schell

SATURDAY, MAY 3, 9 AM

Save May 3, and spread the word, to ride for the Schell and benefit the efforts to restore it for hiking and biking.

On May 3, 2008, Friends of Schell Bridge will sponsor three bike rides in Northfield, starting at 9:00 in the morning. A 17-mile loop will begin at the boat ramp (with its view of Schell Bridge) on the east side of the river, proceed through the village, cross the river on the route 10 bridge and wind through the hills and back roads of west Northfield (venturing briefly into Vermont). This route returns across the route 10 bridge and ends with post-ride festivities at Green Trees Gallery on Main Street. See the route map on the right-hand panel.

This 17-mile ride will be led by experienced bikers and will be family oriented. A 3-mile loop will cater to those family members preferring a gentler ride.

For the serious biking enthusiast a 35-mile loop on both sides of the river in the tri-state area, begins and ends in Northfield.



It's a new year, and Friends of Schell Bridge has many new activities to report! Since joining the organization as Executive Director in

September 2007, I have been occupied with grant writing, pursuing media outlets, and coordinating with individuals and groups who share our enthusiasm for Northfield's historical and natural treasures. I am more convinced than ever that the town has something special to offer future generations if we demonstrate vision and purpose today.

The Schell Bridge is steadily becoming more a symbol of the future than a relic of the past. Our more than 200 members understand that preserving what is beautiful about our town contributes greatly to our sense of who we are in a rapidly changing world. Northfield's strategic location and lovely riverscapes not only unite the two halves of our town to a tri-state region but with careful planning may become an economic boost for local businesses and public coffers alike.

Already, the vision contained in our Strategic Plan, has proven useful to organizations who have donated over \$10,000 for Friends of the Schell and the Greater Northfield Watershed Association. The Local Cultural Council, the Mass Land Trust Coalition, and Mass Riverways, have provided funding for:

- ▶ An **Art Contest** highlighting **A River Town: Views of Northfield**;
- ▶ A training **fellowship** through Mt. Grace Land Trust;
- ▶ A river access project to restore the trail and views from historic **King Philip's Hill**.

When Northfield citizens voted to put the Schell on the demolition list in 1987 they might not have imagined that, twenty years later, the bridge would still be standing. Not only is that the case, but Friends of Schell Bridge have demonstrated that there is interest and support for an alternative to demolition. Let's get behind the vision!



Next Step ...

You read in the Fall 2007 Newsletter that informed estimates of Schell Bridge rehabilitation costs have been received by the board. The bottom line concludes that a \$10 million dollar fundraising effort will repair the bridge and provide a modest endowment for future maintenance. The board is now planning for a campaign to raise as much as \$100,000 to commission a more detailed bridge inspection report. Such a report will provide detailed information about what is needed for each part of the bridge and set the stage for more significant fundraising. Foundation, government, and private resources will be tapped for this effort.

The Friends of Schell Bridge board is committed to sound research and investigation to inform all decisions regarding the future of the bridge.
